“Empower Yourself . . . Empower Others: Mindsets for Leading and Learning”

March 16 - 17, 2017 – Charlottesville, VA

The Eighteenth Annual WELV Conference will bring education leaders to Charlottesville for two days of dynamic presentations and in-depth dialogue. Combining formal speeches with panel discussions, small-group break-out sessions, and social and professional networking opportunities, this yearly conference provides women leaders in Virginia with the opportunity to gain a deeper understanding of issues of importance to them personally and to their professional communities.

The modest registration fee covers parking, breakfast and lunch each day, an evening reception on the first day, copies of all conference resource material—and membership in WELV through March 31, 2018.

MEET THE CONFERENCE INSTITUTE PRESENTER

The Institute Presenter for this year's conference is **Mary Cay Ricci**. A national speaker and education consultant, Mary Cay wrote the New York Times Best Selling Education Book, *Mindsets in the Classroom* (2013). She also authored *Ready to Use Resources for Mindsets in the Classroom* (2015) and *Mindsets for Parents* (2016). She is currently the Supervisor of the Office of Advanced and Enriched Instruction for Prince George's County Public Schools, MD.

In her conference session, Mary Cay will discuss the components of a Growth Mindset Learning Environment that deliberately cultivates non-cognitive skills such as resiliency and perseverance—an environment where all learners increase motivation due to conceptually understanding basic brain function, where children hear feedback about what they do rather than who they are, and where all students have equitable access to advanced learning opportunities.

During the Keynote session, participants will also take part in a discussion about situations in which women educators tend to demonstrate fixed mindset thinking—and how they can move beyond that thinking to embrace growth in their personal and professional lives.

Additional 18th Annual WELV Conference presenters include **Noelle Ellerson**, who will provide an update on federal education policy, and **Cindy Moss**, who will explore how STEM can create a growth mindset that empowers female students.

BOOK TALK


Elaine Fogliani, WELV Executive Director

A woman who, by her accomplishments and her appointments, has provided new pathways for other women to follow by being the first woman selected or appointed to a significant position of leadership not previously held by a woman in Virginia.

[The Rising Star Female Leader](#)

An educator who demonstrates the traits of an outstanding leader and is viewed by her colleagues as an individual with great potential to contribute significantly to education in Virginia.

[The WELV Spirit Award](#)

A leader who has had a significant role in supporting the mission of WELV and who has helped the participation of women in higher levels of educational administration.

Jane Geyer earned a B.S. in Secondary Education with a concentration in Biology from the State University of New York at Oswego. She earned a M.S. in Secondary Education with a concentration in Affective Education at the same university.

For ten years in Upstate New York she taught Life Science, Physical Science, Biology, Applied Chemistry I and II, and Astronomy to students in grades 7-12.

She is now in her second year as the principal of Washington and Lee High School in Westmoreland County.


