Sweet or Not Sweet . . . That is the Question

When one thinks of the 16th birthday or anniversary of a person or event, the words "Sweet 16" comes to mind. However, when you are talking about Virginia's premier conference for women education leaders, the word "sweet" in its traditional use of the term doesn't seem to apply. Then you look at the theme of the 16th Annual WELV Conference and the word "sweet" doesn't seem to be a descriptor for the event.

However, before we cast out the word "sweet", let me suggest another use of the word that I think definitely applies to the conference and to its theme - "Sweet Spot". Let's start with the definition of the term:

"The sweet spot is a place where a combination of factors results in a maximum response for a given amount of effort. In tennis, squash, racquetball, baseball, or cricket, a given swing will result in a more powerful hit if the ball strikes the racket or bat on the latter's sweet spot."

"The sweet spot is the location at which the object being struck, usually a ball, absorbs the maximum amount of the available forward momentum and rebounds away from the racket, bat, club, etc. with a greater velocity than if struck at any other point on the racket, bat or club."

So, armored with these definitions, I am emboldened to suggest that those attending the 16th Annual Conference of WELV will experience the "maximum response" from a conference and will leave the conference with a "more powerful hit" to obtain "the maximum amount" of velocity to serve as an educational leader. Thus, the "Sweet Spot" for women education leaders will be March 19-20 in Charlottesville. The Outstanding Service to Education Award

A role model and mentor to emerging female leaders who has made a particularly significant and unusual contribution to education in Virginia.

The Breaking the Glass Ceiling Award

A woman who, by her accomplishments and her appointments, has provided new pathways for other women to follow by being the first woman selected or appointed to a significant position of leadership not previously held by a woman in Virginia.

The Rising Star Female Leader

An educator who demonstrates the traits of an outstanding leader and is viewed by her colleagues as an individual with great potential to contribute significantly to education in Virginia.

The WELV Spirit Award

A leader who has had a significant role in supporting the mission of WELV and who has helped the participation of women in higher levels of educational administration.

The Nominations Committee of the WELV Board will review completed nomination packets for each of the awards and make recommendations to the full WELV Board based on stated criteria. The WELV Board will make all final decisions and will confer awards as appropriate. Awards are only given as qualified recipients are identified.

LYNCHBURG FORUM REPORT

The 6th Lynchburg Regional WELV Forum was held on October 18th at Randolph College. Over two dozen educators attended the half-day event which featured Delegate Jennifer McClellan as the keynote speaker. Delegate McClellan discussed the importance of education as well as educators' civic duty to communicate with their legislators on a regular basis.

Participants also heard from a panel which included a college student, two teachers, and a high school principal who shared their personal experiences in urban classrooms. Panelists included Travis Brown, Kelsey Cline, Rachel Reid, and Dr. Tracy Richardson.

Following this, attendees chose between two break-out sessions. Evianna Ross, Executive Director and founder of the nonprofit The Sparrow's Nest, Inc., discussed at-risk and at-promise students, while Dr. Allison Jordan, assistant principal at William Campbell Combined High School, discussed her dissertation, "*Beneath the Glass Ceiling: What Causes Some Qualified Female Educators to Remain in the Classroom While Others Obtain Leadership Roles?*"

Sponsored by a partnership through Lynchburg College, Randolph College, and WELV, the event was funded by a Community Events Grant at Randolph College.
